

COVID-19 Strikes!

Our Field Operation Was Ready and Delivered A Powerful Punch Even in the New Virtual Reality



- Launched Provider Appreciation Program engaged 130 providers (Goal 150)
- Engaged 114 Pre-K Counts/HSSAP grantees in advocacy efforts (Goal: 75)
- Held 25 professional development sessions (Goal 30) and 30 screenings of No Small Matter (Goal 18) to educate, support and/or engage provider community in advocacy; many sessions reached maximum Zoom capacities
- "Capitol caravans" became multi-provider Zoom meetings with legislators (Held 38 / Goal: 31)





- Head Start began in 1965 as a summer program. Was designed to help break cycle of poverty in low income families.
- It is a comprehensive program established to meet the emotional, social, health, nutritional and psychological needs of those in a lower socio-economic bracket.
- The Head Start program is 55 years old and focuses on the education of children and their families ages 3-5.
- Early Head Start is 25 years old and focuses on the education and economic development of children and families 0-3 years of age.
- Comprehensive services are what make Early Head Start and Head Start unique from other Early Childhood Programs.
